Welcome to the 4-H School Public Speaking Contest, formally known as the 4-H Tropicana Public Speaking Contest. We are looking forward to another exciting year. The objective of the 4-H School Public Speaking Contest is to teach students to think on their feet, speak confidently, and communicate effectively.

The contest format has changed to comply with COVID restrictions; regardless, we will acclimatize and move forward. Jefferson County 4-H values classroom teachers.

#### The Classroom Competition

Each homeroom selects the top three classroom winners in the 4th, 5th, and 6th-grade. The top three in each classroom advance to the school contest. 1st-3rd place winners from each classroom receive ribbons.

#### **The School Contest**

Each school selects their top three school winners in the 4th & 5th-grade division and 6th-grade division. Be mindful, the 4th & 5th grade compete in the same division. The top three winners from each division from the school contest will advance to the county-wide competition. The school will record the school winners to a YouTube video and forward it to John Lilly at jgl@ufl.edu. All YouTube videos will be password protected and unlisted to safeguard the students. The deadline to submit videos is Friday, Nov 13, on or before 5pm.

#### The County Contest

Jefferson County 4-H will facilitate the county contest. Judging will occur virtually, and judge biographies will be sent via email. On Nov 19, students, staff, family, and friends can view other participants' speeches on YouTube. The result from the county-wide contest will be announced on Tuesday, Nov 24.

The County Council fosters mastery by empowering council members to develop and teach concepts related to leadership and civic engagement, Belonging by building rapport among 4-H'ers with similar interests, Independence by encouraging the management and education of serving on and leading committees and business meetings, and Generosity through regular community service project and building team rapport.
