4H TIDBITS

May Wildlife Happenings

• May initiates the onset of Florida's summer.

Birds of Florida

- Brown pelican and white ibis young are now visible in nests.
- Painted Buntings nest through summer in northeast Florida.
- Least terns and snowy plovers nest on Panhandle beaches.
- Bald eagles begin migrating north
- Breeding begins for many resident and summer songbirds
- The last of the cedar waxwings and goldfinches head for their northern breeding grounds.
- Least terns and Snowy Plovers nest on beaches and sandy flats of the Panhandle.

Mammals of Florida

• Gray Bats congregate at maternity caves now through mid-July.

Reptiles of Florida

- Alligators begin to court and make loud resounding 'bellows'.
- Loggerhead sea turtles begin nesting on summer nights.
- Soft-shell and alligator snapping turtles complete egg laying.

<u>Fish of Florida</u>

- Bluegill are bedding at the full moon.
- Redbreast sunfish and spotted sunfish begin spawning in rivers
- Pompano running in the surf in north Florida
 <u>Plants of Florida</u>
- American lotus bloom at Paynes Prairies State Preserve

May Gardening Guide <u>What to Plant</u>

- Annuals/Bedding Plants: Plants that can take summer heat include salvia, angelonia, wax begonia, and ornamental pepper.
- Bulbs: Planting varieties of daylily ensures months of color from these low-maintenance plants.
- Herbs: Continue to plant heat-loving herbs, including basil, oregano, Mexican tarragon, and rosemary.
- Vegetables: Swiss chard will take the heat as well as okra, southern pea, and sweet potato.

What to Do

- Pests: Insects become more active in warm weather. Watch for thrips, scales, and mites on ornamental plants.
- Gardenias: Yellowing of older leaves is usually normal; yellowing of new growth usually indicates a micronutrient deficiency.
- Oleanders: Inspect chewed or ragged leaves for oleander caterpillars at work.
- Lawn insects: Watch for damage from chinch bugs in St. Augustine grass and begin scouting for newly hatched mole crickets in bahia grass lawns.
- Tomatoes: Watch for pests, disease, and nutritional disorders on tomato plants.
- New plants: Produce more plants by air layering, grafting, division, or cuttings.
- Trees: Prepare for hurricane season by checking trees for damaged or weak branches and pruning if needed. Hire an ISA-certified arborist.
- Lawn Mowing: Encourage healthy growth and discourage insects, weeds, and diseases by mowing correctly.

During the month of May I challenge all 4Hers to get out to your local parks and have an adventure. There are so many wonderful places that are right under our nose to get out and enjoy. There is also a challenge from the Florida Fish and wildlife service with prizes to go and visit Wildlife Management Areas and record what you see. 4-H'ers are not allowed to be in store (including the parking lot for Spring 2021) per TSC Corporate.

<u>NEW FOR THE SPRING EVENT:</u> 4-H Counties/ Clubs can set up a display near the 22x28 poster that will be posted in store.

CONTEST: TSC stores will submit photo of display to corporate who will select winners and award gift cards. So your county could win a tractor supply gift card, expected to be relatively sizable (over \$100 at least).

Due to COVID-19, this display will not be manned during the event.

No more than four individuals from the 4-H club (including the advisor) are allowed in store for set up/ tear down.

4-H Members and Advisors must follow TSC safety protocols: wear face coverings appropriately, maintain 6' social distancing from TSC Team Members and customers, use hand sanitizer & have temperature taken when arriving to the store to set up/take down.

No one with symptoms or exposure should be permitted to participate.

The 4-Hers will check in with the Manager on duty to introduce themselves upon arrival.

The standalone displays will only be up during the duration of the 12-day campaign.

Local 4-H programs should reach out to confirm set up/ take down timing with the Store Manager.

Suggested Set Up: April 27th from 6:00 - 8:00 pm. Suggested Tear Down: May 9th from 2:00 - 5:00 pm.

The display cannot block any walkways. No impeding traffic in & out of the store.

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D-3 Public Speaking Contest

The 4-H District III Public Speaking Program Held

The Annual 4-H District III Public Speaking contest is the final step in the public speaking education program. The program was conducted by Aucilla Christian Academy and Somerset K-12 Schools, administered by 4-H, and supported by the Florida 4-H Foundation.

The contest was held at the Wakulla County Extension Office on Saturday, April 24. Five speakers participated in the 4th& 5th-grade division and five in the sixthgrade division. Jefferson County had two outstanding students to participate in the contest. In the 4th& 5thgrade division was Larrie Cherry, the title of her speech, "5th Grade Girl Extinction." In the sixth-grade division was Maggie Walker, the title of her speech, "North Florida Citrus." Both received honorable mention and received a 4-H medallion and a participation certificate.

The Florida 4-H Public Speaking Program (formerly known as the 4-H Tropicana Public Speaking Program) began in 1969 in Manatee County. Prior to 1986, the program was conducted in the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades in eight Florida counties. In 1986 Leon County became the first North Florida county to participate in what is now known as the Florida 4-H Public Speaking Program. Other Panhandle counties soon followed. It is our goal that every youngster will receive public speaking instruction for three years.

The objectives of the Florida 4-H Public Speaking program are for all fourth, fifth, and sixth-grade students to:

- \cdot Recognize the necessity of obtaining as much of the available information on a given topic as possible.
- Carefully organize the material to be presented in a timed, orderly, and thorough speech.
- Develop a pleasing personal appearance before an audience.
- Acquire the ability to speak convincingly in public, expressing ideas effectively.
- · Develop confidence and poise.
- Be recognized for their accomplishments through participation and competition.
